WordLoveWorldLove Teacher's Guide

<u>Overview</u>

WordLoveWorldLove documents the journey of children from two continents responding to the affects of a natural disaster, the South Asia tsunami of 2004.

It begins with Rose Charities and the children's stories and drawings the volunteer doctors and counselors have brought back to Canada from Sri Lanka. It continues with a dream to help those young spirits heal with a simple act of kindness: inspirational words that are illustrated as messages of hope and encouragement. The same words fill the branches of a Dream Tree to be shared between the two cultures. This simple compassionate gesture is warmly received and reciprocated with a desire to connect and spread the word, so to speak. Sister schools are created as a result. The journey begins anew with new goals, new faces and new hope for a better world as students engage in their community in a way that empowers them to be responsible citizens of the world.

Objectives

- 1. To become more familiar with world social issues
- 2. To understand and practice the UN Universal Declarations and universal common values
- 3. To experience interconnectedness with other children
- 4. To practice empathy and acts of kindness in a variety of ways
- 5. To examine the energy of words and actions and be able to illustrate one's own universal language of peace and compassion

6. To recognize the different roles that global citizens play (ie. charities, filmmakers, teachers, students, etc)

7. To engage in a global or local community to empower students to be responsible citizens

8. To honour that every child has the power in their words and actions to make change in the world.

Grade Levels

Intermediate through Secondary

Introduction

The purpose of this documentary is to inspire dialogue and action among children. It creates opportunity for children to see the possibilities of being sensitive to others and empowering them with hope. It is a guide for children to believe in something larger than themselves, and to maintain a sense of dignity and respect for each other as is written in the UN's Declaration of Human Rights (article #1).

<u>Theme</u>

WordLoveWorldLove explores how creative power is integral to the well being of the human spirit.

- 10. How did the Sri Lankan children benefit from the act of kindness from the North Vancouver children? And in turn, how did the North Vancouver children benefit from this experience?
- 11. What would be your word to place on the Dream Tree?
- 12. Did the film change your view of the world? If so, how?

a) Find out what role Canada plays in international global aid.

b) Research countries affected by natural disasters. List the kinds of humanitarian effort used to rebuild the community.

Science

- a) Find out how tsunamis (or other natural disasters) occur.
- b) What role did trees play in the devastation of the flood?

Fine Arts

- a) Create your own WordLoveWorldLove word and Dream Tree.
- b) Locate a photo of Emily Carr's painting entitled "Happiness" and describe the energy in the painting.

Social Responsibility

In your school or community, follow through with a **collective** act of kindness with the intent to empower a group in need of support. Observe the results.

Take Action!

- Connect with a charitable (non profit) organization. Find ways to create an authentic experience over the course of a year to connect with a community where children are in need of hope and support.
- Form a WordLoveWorldLove club. Discuss global social issues and ways to build bridges and awareness using the energy of words rather than money.
- Create a Dream Tree for your school.
 Adopt a tree outside or make one for inside, and have different classes hang WordLoveWorldLove words on WordLeaves or hearts to convey messages of hope.

Fact Sheet: Sri Lanka

Sri Lanka is located in Southern Asia, an island off the coast of India in the Indian Ocean. It is formerly known as Serendib and Ceylon.

Official Name Flag	The Democratic Socialist Republic of Sri Lanka symbolizes the independence and the unity of the major ethnic groups: the Sinhalese (the lion) the Moors (the green band) and the Tamils (the orange band). In the corners are four bo leaves that stand for universal love, kindness, joy and equanimity.

Fact Sheet: Tsunami

- Tsunamis generally happen once every 10 years, most often in the Pacific Ocean
- A tidal wave usually resulting from an underwater earthquake
- Very long wavelengths (20 300 km) and can travel up to 1000 km/h); it can also be more than 30 m high
- Travel faster in deep water and steeply sloped ocean floor causes waves to grow very high
- First wave is not the most destructive and can be 10 minutes to an hour apart from each other
- Most destruction comes from the debris carried in the waves
- No tsunami warning system in place at the time for South Asia
- Tsunami warnings are:
 - 1) ground shakes
 - 2) ocean pulls back suddenly from shore
 - 3) waves can be up to an hour apart and one must head for higher ground
